As we reflect on progress over the past year, it is your involvement that makes a difference in the United Nations Association of the National Capital Area (UNA-NCA). Through the strategic focus of dozens of volunteer leaders, together with a mighty impactful programs and

We advance U.S. engagement in the United Nations and further our members' understanding of complex international issues. Democracy is challenged, both here within our own nation and beyond our borders. The Universal Declaration of Human Rights continues to be a beacon as violations occur based on race, ethnicity, gender, LGBTQ+, disability, and religion. The UN Peacekeepers are stretched thin. The U.S. needs the UN and the UN needs the U.S. This partnership is essential for building lasting peace during this decade of action.

While the COVID pandemic continues, programming and committee progress has proceeded almost exclusively in the virtual format, allowing diverse UNA-NCA events examining a participation. spectrum of issues from COP26 climate talks to nuclear proliferation, and Indigenous rights have taken place on computer monitors, tablets and phones across the DC, Maryland and Virginia region, often with guests and friends from across the nation and globe. We convened a presentation at the UN Commission on the Status of Women (CSW66) focused on girls, education, and climate. The Global Classrooms DC Model UN Conference took place in person, co-sponsored by the U.S. Department of State and the host's headquarters, the U.S. Institute of Peace at which middle and high school students practiced the art of principled diplomacy. Graduate Fellows program, composed of 31 masters' and doctoral students from area universities, convened its first hybrid program as it nurtured the professional development and understanding of complex issues through a UN lens.

Partnerships are key to UNA-NCA delivering impactful experiences to members and the broader community. These diverse partnerships provide greater visibility and reach, enhanced programming, research, and at times, financial support to the association. Our Global Goals at Home program that examines the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) from our local realities has received national and international recognition and forged relationships with 50+ organizations who have a stake in local outcomes of the SDGs. Our Young Professionals continued to offer professional development opportunities through its career series. Our advocacy work, with the DC for CEDAW as a case in point, is stronger as we engage with partners for legislative progress.

Through pursuing common interests with UN agencies, the U.S. government, think tanks, NGOs, universities, and others, we fulfill our mission. For the last two years, our President Paula Boland has served as National Council Chair of the United Nations Association of the USA, which has opened doors for our chapter and increased its visibility.

UNA-NCA is in a solid financial position due to prudent budgeting and decisions combined with generous donors and institutional partners, including the World Bank Community Connections Campaign. Of course, there is so much more we can do – and will do.

Our strategic planning continues as we build out UNA-NCA as a vital force that links the local to the global.

Together, we can accomplish great things in the years ahead. Thank you for your ongoing support and commitment to building a strong U.S.-UN partnership.



UNA-NCA's Graduate Fellows Program (GFP) offers a semester-long engagement to graduate and post-graduate students competitively selected from DC-area universities. During the 2022 Program, GFP Fellows participated in SDG training offered to UN staff, engaged with volunteer mentors operating at senior levels in their fields, and participated in weekly explorations of global challenges confronting the UN system, alongside current and former U.S. and UN officials. For the 2022 spring semester, the GFP pivoted to a hybrid format, and enjoyed virtual dialogue with UN personnel in DC and overseas. From early January until late April, thirty-one students originating from fifteen countries shared in a journey towards better understanding the UN system, and how, as professionals, they can define their path towards UN-related careers.

The United Nations Association of the National Capital Area has been a leading force in support, awareness, and action to bring local implementation of the UN Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination Against Women in Washington DC. UNA-NCA continues to lead a coalition of organizations to advocate for the passage of a recently introduced bill implementing key components of CEDAW in D.C. UNA-NCA also joined a coalition of organizations including the League of Women Voters and the Zonta Club to support the successful passage of a resolution of support for CEDAW in Fairfax, VA.

UNA-NCA advocates are looking to build strong advocacy priorities that energize individuals, local elected officials, and grassroots organizations around human rights at the global and local level.

Coffee Chats brought together leaders across the UN, the private sector, and civil society for dynamic explorations of diversity and inclusion as an integral imperative when addressing the most pressing challenges of our generation. UNA-NCA hosted a parallel event as part of the 66th UN Commission on the Status of Women Forum. UNA-NCA highlighted the work of the UN Population Fund (UNFPA), Global Campaign for Education, CAMFED International and UN Women to discuss girls education, empowerment and girls' influence on climate mitigation and resiliency.

Mobilizing at the Grassroots

UNA-NCA hosted meetings with Congressional offices to build legislative support for the UN and key UN agencies delivering force-multiplying services such as peacekeeping, ending food insecurity and reducing education gaps for refugees and other immigrants directly impacted by the ongoing global conflicts that continue to escalate in early 2022. UNA-NCA Advocacy moves beyond Congressional offices to key agencies in the Biden Administration to develop actionable recommendations for the Department of State, and local implementation in furtherance of the SDGs.






Global Classrooms DC (GCDC)

Fall Model UN Training Conference

The 2021 conference was held virtually in partnership with the Pan-American Health Organization (PAHO). Joining the conference were 131 students from 12 schools across the region and from other parts of the United States as well. *Annual Spring Model UN Conference*

In the spring, in partnership with U.S. Department of State's International Organization (IO) Bureau and the United States Institute of Peace (USIP), GCDC hosted its annual Spring Conference, serving as the culminating event of the year-round program. For 2022, GCDC returned to an in-person format after two years, hosting the conference with USIP. With over 200 delegates from 17 schools from across the region in attendance, the delegates were able to hear pre-recorded remarks from U.S. Secretary of State Antony Blinken; Ambassador George Moose, USIP Board of Directors Chair; Ambassador Michele J. Sison, Assistant Secretary of State of the IO Bureau; and Cynthia Yue, the U.S. Youth Observer to the UN.

Emerging Leaders

In 2021, GCDC and the UNA-NCA Advocacy team launched the Emerging Leaders Fellowship. The inaugural cohort includes 19 students, ranging from sixth graders to college undergraduates.



Global Goals at Home bridges the gap between global goals and local action; through the creation of an online dashboard, GGH is cataloging, localizing, and contextualizing progress towards achieving the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) across the DMV.

The SDGs offer an interconnected blueprint for sustainable and inclusive change, as well as a necessary framework for collaborating across stakeholders. However, the SDGs measure progress using benchmarks that do not capture the reality of inequality and critical need in the United States, particularly municipal level.
